


Who we are:

Facing Forward empowers women and families to turn their backs to chronic homelessness and face forward in becoming confidently independent.





What we do:

- We **empower** women who have made a decision to change their lives.
- We provide permanent **housing**, giving our women the security of consistent safety.
- We give **hope** by partnering with our clients to create a personalized path from homelessness to self-sufficiency and we walk with our clients along that path until they get there.
- We help our clients along their path by surrounding them with the educational, employment, and healthcare (mental and physical) linkages and support they need to become confidently independent.
- We end generational cycles of homelessness by helping our clients transform our housing into their home, by reuniting them with their children, supporting their family as a whole and celebrating successes.

Why it matters:

We partner with homeless women in order to turn their lives around.

Shelters which provide temporary housing fail to provide the long-term security needed for stability and growth. Our clients don't just have a place to lay their heads at night, they have the security of their own homes. This enables them to make the transformations they need in order to become confidently independent.

We help break the cycle of homelessness for homeless children.

Homeless children in the shelter system experience inconsistencies in housing and support which often result in frequent school changes and low attendance rates, which prevent them from thriving in the classroom. The security and stability of permanent housing and the support provided by Facing Forward enables our children to focus on their education, grow, and construct progressive lives in order to end their own cycle of homelessness.

We help make a better world by making stronger communities.

2015 Success stories

"Why don't you want to be my mother anymore?"

These words from Mary's oldest son initiated the change in her life that would eventually lead her to Facing Forward. Mary had struggled for many



years with her own and the burden of an abusive husband. After attempts and failures in managing her own change, Mary found herself needing partnership. She admitted herself to a treatment facility which transitioned her to a temporary shelter and eventually led her to Facing Forward.

Since partnering with Facing Forward, Mary has found much success in becoming the women she is proud to be. She has strengthened relationships with her family and now sees her children as her strongest allies and she as theirs. After 35 years, Mary decided to return to school. She has renewed her cosmetology license and has started a program to obtain her license to teach cosmetology. Her oldest son, who once begged her to not stop being his mother, joined the navy and is now home. Her middle son manages a restaurant in Evanston, her youngest son is a chef in Northbrook, and her daughter received a basketball scholarship and is now majoring in psychology. *Together*, Mary and her family are facing forward.

Like Mother Like Daughter.

Wendy (pictured standing) came to Facing Forward in 2007 looking for an opportunity to turn her back to homelessness. She partnered with her



case manager, Sarah, who helped her identify and address the root causes of her homelessness. In 2011, Wendy graduated with her high school diploma from the Michael Barlow Center, and created an atmosphere of learning for her family.

Wendy's decision to prioritize education was not lost on her daughter, Sparkle (pictured seated), who works hard to ensure her academics are in order. In the spring of 2015, Sparkle finished her sophomore year ranked 10th in her class! She, along with 38 other Facing Forward students, finished the term with all A's and B's! We are eager to see what the future will hold for Sparkle as she continues to focus on her education and her extra-curriculars.

The Crochet Queens at Facing Forward

This year, as a result of our partnership with Rush, Medical Student, Eileen Wang, organized a new group at Facing Forward designed to



assist clients in coping with smoking cessation through crocheting. It wasn't long before clients began to experience the many benefits of crocheting including decreased stress levels, decreases in their smoking, and increased social skills as well as an increased sense of purpose. As the group continued to be popular amongst our clients, they began to identify themselves as The Crochet Queens at Facing Forward.

For Valerie (pictured to the right), being a Crochet Queen has provided her with a new skill and passion as well as a community of friends






FY 2015 Financial Results:

Total Revenue- \$1,450,506




Revenue Other- \$35,333

- 1985: Founded as "Interfaith Council for the Homeless"
 - 1990's: Operated City-Wide Warming Centers for Chicago Department of Human Services
- 2003: Initiated Housing First with 63 single women and 6 families at Sanctuary Place

- 2014: Rev. Doug Bradshaw becomes Executive Director
- 2014: Added 3 families to our Shelter Graduates Program

- 2005: Bill Johnson becomes Executive Director
- 2008: ICH is awarded a contract to provide 29 scattered site Shelter Plus Care units and develops the Shelter Graduates program.

- 2015 Added 4 families and 1 individual to our Shelter Graduates Program
- Staff of 11 with 6 Case Managers and an Advanced Practice Nurse

- 2010: Interfaith Council for the Homeless changed its name to Facing Forward to End Homelessness
- 2013: FF is awarded a HUD grant to extend our services to 15 additional scattered site families

- Funding from Federal, State and City of Chicago grants, plus private giving.
- Now serves 64 single women and 54 families at our Sanctuary Place facility on the West Side and at scattered site locations throughout Chicago.
